Background & Methodology

BACKGROUND

The research conducted by Morning Consult on behalf of Better World Campaign among Americans sought to understand the following:

- 1 Appetite for international cooperation to address health crises, such as coronavirus
- The impact of an increasingly interconnected world on coronavirus
- Level of trust for the World Health Organization to coordinate and manage the response to health crises, such as coronavirus

METHODOLOGY

This poll was conducted by Morning Consult on behalf of Better World Campaign from March 06 - 09, 2020, among a national sample of 2200 Adults. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of Adults based on age, race/ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, and region. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 2 percentage points.

Key Points

- Thinking about coronavirus specifically, 4 in 5 adults across party lines say it is important that the U.S. work to limit the spread of coronavirus in other countries (82%), with half saying it is *very* important (52%).
- Three quarters of adults say they trust the World Health Organization to coordinate among countries when it comes to slowing the spread of coronavirus (77%) and to manage the response to international health outbreaks like coronavirus (77%), surpassing any other entity tested.
- Two thirds of adults say global cooperation to address health crises is a *top* priority (67%).
- Three quarters of adults also say the U.S. should cooperate with the global community more to address health crises (75%), with half saying the U.S. should cooperate *much* more (52%).
- Sixty percent of adults say they *strongly* support international cooperation to slow the spread of coronavirus globally (60%). Adults also *strongly* support sharing scientific research between countries (71%).



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Half of adults feel the world has become more connected in the last 5 years (52%).


Thinking about the last 5 years, do you feel the world has become more connected or less connected?



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Republicans (59%) are slightly more likely than Democrats (50%) to say they feel the world has become more connected in the last 5 years.


Thinking about the last 5 years, do you feel the world has become more connected or less connected?



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Adults are divided on whether the U.S. has gained more (37%) or lost more (33%) due to an increasingly interconnected world.



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Republicans (48%) are more likely than Democrats (35%) to say the U.S. has gained more from an increasingly interconnected world.

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

How much of a priority should it be for the global community to cooperate on the following issues?




International Cooperation

Should the United States cooperate more or less with the global community to address the following issues?



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
Current State of Coronavirus

In the last month, how much have you seen, read, or heard about the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19)?




Current State of Coronavirus

In the last month, how much have you seen, read, or heard about the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19)?




Current State of Coronavirus

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Two thirds of adults say they are worried about the spread of coronavirus in other countries (67%).

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

4 in 5 adults say it is important that the U.S. work to limit the spread of coronavirus in other countries (82%), with half saying it is *very* important (52%).


How important is it, if at all, that the U.S. work to limit the spread of coronavirus in other countries?



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The majority of both Democrats (88%) and Republicans (80%) say it is important that the U.S. work to limit the spread of coronavirus in other countries, though Democrats respond with higher intensity (63% say *very* important).

How important is it, if at all, that the U.S. work to limit the spread of coronavirus in other countries?




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Adults believe multiple entities tested are responsible for slowing the spread of coronavirus, including individuals (82%), intergovernmental organizations* like World Health Organization (78%) and United Nations (68%), governments (79%), and corporations (59%).


From the following list of entities, how responsible, if at all, are each of the following for slowing the spread of coronavirus?



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Sixty percent of adults say they *strongly* support international cooperation to slow the spread of coronavirus globally (60%). Adults also *strongly* support sharing scientific research between countries (71%).

Do you support or oppose each of the following measures to slow the spread of coronavirus globally?



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
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Three quarters of adults say they trust the World Health Organization to coordinate among countries when it comes to slowing the spread of coronavirus (77%), surpassing any other entity tested. Two thirds say they trust the United Nations (65%).*

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Similarly, adults are most likely, of the entities tested, to say they trust the World Health Organization to manage the response to international health outbreaks, like coronavirus (77%).*
